1 AN ACT concerning crimes, punishment and criminal procedure; relating
2 to supervision of offenders; updating the terms of supervision for
3 offenders on probation and postrelease supervision; amending K.S.A.
4 21-6607, 22-2907 and 22-3717 and repealing the existing sections.
5

6 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

7 Section 1. K.S.A. 21-6607 is hereby amended to read as follows: 21-
8 6607. (a) Except as required by subsection (c), nothing in this section shall
9 be construed to limit the authority of the court to impose or modify any
10 general or specific conditions of probation, suspension of sentence or
11 assignment to a community correctional services program. The court
12 services officer or community correctional services officer may
13 recommend, and the court may order, the imposition of any conditions of
14 probation, suspension of sentence or assignment to a community
15 correctional services program. For crimes committed on or after July 1,
16 1993, in presumptive nonprison cases, the court services officer or
17 community correctional services officer may recommend, and the court
18 may order, the imposition of any conditions of probation or assignment to
19 a community correctional services program. The court may at any time
20 order the modification of such conditions, after notice to the court services
21 officer or community correctional services officer and an opportunity for
22 such officer to be heard thereon. The court shall cause a copy of any such
23 order to be delivered to the court services officer and the probationer or to
24 the community correctional services officer and the community corrections
25 participant, as the case may be. The provisions of K.S.A. 75-5291, and
26 amendments thereto, shall be applicable to any assignment to a community
27 correctional services program pursuant to this section.

28 (b) The court may impose any conditions of probation, suspension of
29 sentence or assignment to a community correctional services program that
30 the court deems proper, including, but not limited to, requiring that the
31 defendant:

32 (1) ~~Avoid such injurious or vicious habits, as directed by the court,~~
33 ~~court services officer or community correctional services officer;~~

34 (2) ~~avoid such persons or places of disreputable or harmful character,~~
35 ~~as directed by the court, court services officer or community correctional~~

1 services officer;

2 ~~(3) report to the court services officer or community correctional~~
3 ~~services officer as directed;~~

4 ~~(4) permit the court services officer or community correctional~~
5 ~~services officer to visit the defendant at home or elsewhere;~~

6 ~~(5) work faithfully at suitable employment insofar as possible;~~

7 ~~(6) remain within the state unless the court grants permission to~~
8 ~~leave;~~

9 ~~(7) pay a fine or costs, applicable to the offense, in one or several~~
10 ~~sums and in the manner as directed by the court;~~

11 ~~(8) support the defendant's dependents;~~

12 ~~(9) reside in a residential facility located in the community and~~
13 ~~participate in educational, counseling, work and other correctional or~~
14 ~~rehabilitative programs;~~

15 ~~(10) perform community or public service work for local~~
16 ~~governmental agencies, private corporations organized not for profit, or~~
17 ~~charitable or social service organizations performing services for the~~
18 ~~community;~~

19 ~~(11) perform services under a system of day fines whereby the~~
20 ~~defendant is required to satisfy fines, costs or reparation or restitution~~
21 ~~obligations by performing services for a period of days, determined by the~~
22 ~~court on the basis of ability to pay, standard of living, support obligations~~
23 ~~and other factors;~~

24 ~~(12) participate in a house arrest program pursuant to K.S.A. 21-~~
25 ~~6609, and amendments thereto;~~

26 ~~(13) order the defendant to pay the administrative fee authorized by~~
27 ~~K.S.A. 22-4529, and amendments thereto, unless waived by the court; or~~

28 ~~(14) in felony cases, except for violations of K.S.A. 8-1567, and~~
29 ~~amendments thereto, be confined in a county jail not to exceed 60 days,~~
30 ~~which need not be served consecutively~~*Obey all laws and ordinances and*
31 *report any law enforcement contact to the defendant's supervision officer*
32 *within 24 hours after such contact;*

33 *(2) not engage in physical violence or threats of violence of any kind*
34 *and, if the defendant is being supervised for conviction of a felony, not*
35 *purchase or possess a dangerous weapon, including a firearm, while on*
36 *supervision;*

37 *(3) report to the defendant's supervision officer as directed and be*
38 *truthful in all matters;*

39 *(4) remain within the state of Kansas or other specified areas as*
40 *defined by the defendant's supervision officer;*

41 *(5) reside at the defendant's approved residence unless the defendant*
42 *receives permission from the defendant's supervision officer to relocate*
43 *and notify the defendant's supervision officer within 24 hours after any*

1 *emergency changes in residence or contact information;*

2 *(6) not possess, use or distribute any controlled substances except*
3 *those prescribed by a licensed medical professional;*

4 *(7) not possess or consume any form of alcohol or intoxicating*
5 *substance or enter any establishment where alcohol is sold or consumed*
6 *as the primary business;*

7 *(8) submit to any form of alcohol or substance use testing directed by*
8 *the defendant's supervision officer and not alter or tamper with the*
9 *specimen or test;*

10 *(9) participate in assessment, treatment, programming and other*
11 *directives of the court or the defendant's supervision officer;*

12 *(10) ~~submit~~ **be subject** to searches of the defendant's person, effects,*
13 *vehicle, residence ~~or~~ **and** property by ~~the defendant's supervision officer~~ **a***
14 ***court services officer, community correctional services officer** or any*
15 ***other** law enforcement officer based on reasonable suspicion that the*
16 *defendant violated conditions of ~~supervision~~ **probation** or engaged in*
17 *criminal activity; or*

18 *(11) refrain from contacting victims unless authorized by the court to*
19 *contact a victim as part of rehabilitative or therapeutic purposes.*

20 (c) In addition to any ~~other~~ conditions of probation, suspension of
21 sentence or assignment to a community correctional services program
22 ordered pursuant to subsection (b), the court shall order the defendant to
23 ~~comply with each of the following conditions:~~

24 (1) ~~The defendant shall obey all laws of the United States, the state of~~
25 ~~Kansas and any other jurisdiction to the laws of which the defendant may~~
26 ~~be subject;~~

27 ~~(2)~~—Make reparation or restitution to the aggrieved party for the
28 damage or loss caused by the defendant's crime in accordance with K.S.A.
29 21-6604(b), and amendments thereto;

30 ~~(3)~~(2) (A) pay a correctional supervision fee of \$60 if the person was
31 convicted of a misdemeanor or a fee of \$120 if the person was convicted
32 of a felony. In any case the amount of the correctional supervision fee
33 specified by this paragraph may be reduced or waived by the judge if the
34 person is unable to pay that amount;

35 (B) the correctional supervision fee imposed by this paragraph shall
36 be charged and collected by the district court. The clerk of the district
37 court shall remit all revenues received under this paragraph from
38 correctional supervision fees to the state treasurer in accordance with the
39 provisions of K.S.A. 75-4215, and amendments thereto. Upon receipt of
40 each such remittance, the state treasurer shall deposit the entire amount in
41 the state treasury to the credit of the state general fund, a sum equal to
42 41.67% of such remittance, and to the correctional supervision fund, a sum
43 equal to 58.33% of such remittance;

1 (C) this paragraph shall apply to persons placed on felony or
2 misdemeanor probation or released on misdemeanor parole to reside in
3 Kansas and supervised by Kansas court services officers under the
4 interstate compact for offender supervision; and

5 (D) this paragraph shall not apply to persons placed on probation or
6 released on parole to reside in Kansas under the uniform act for out-of-
7 state parolee supervision; *and*

8 ~~(4)~~(3) reimburse the state general fund for all or a part of the
9 expenditures by the state board of indigents' defense services to provide
10 counsel and other defense services to the defendant. In determining the
11 amount and method of payment of such sum, the court shall take account
12 of the financial resources of the defendant and the nature of the burden that
13 payment of such sum will impose. A defendant who has been required to
14 pay such sum and who is not willfully in default in the payment thereof
15 may at any time petition the court which sentenced the defendant to waive
16 payment of such sum or of any unpaid portion thereof. If it appears to the
17 satisfaction of the court that payment of the amount due will impose
18 manifest hardship on the defendant or the defendant's immediate family,
19 the court may waive payment of all or part of the amount due or modify
20 the method of payment. The amount of attorney fees to be included in the
21 court order for reimbursement shall be the amount claimed by appointed
22 counsel on the payment voucher for indigents' defense services or the
23 amount prescribed by the board of indigents' defense services
24 reimbursement tables as provided in K.S.A. 22-4522, and amendments
25 thereto, whichever is less;

26 ~~(5) be subject to searches of the defendant's person, effects, vehicle,~~
27 ~~residence and property by a court services officer, a community~~
28 ~~correctional services officer and any other law enforcement officer based~~
29 ~~on reasonable suspicion of the defendant violating conditions of probation~~
30 ~~or criminal activity; and~~

31 ~~(6) be subject to random, but reasonable, tests for drug and alcohol~~
32 ~~consumption as ordered by a court services officer or community~~
33 ~~correctional services officer.~~

34 (d) *The office of judicial administration and the department of*
35 *corrections shall collaborate to develop documentation related to*
36 *conditions of supervision.*

37 (e) Any law enforcement officer ~~conducting~~ **who conducts** a search
38 pursuant to subsection ~~(e)(5)~~ *(b)(10)* shall submit a written report to the
39 appropriate court services officer or community correctional services
40 officer ~~no~~ **not** later than the close of ~~the next business day~~ **business the**
41 **next day** after such search **is conducted**. The written report shall include
42 the facts leading to such search, the scope of such search and any findings
43 resulting from such search.

1 (e)(f) There is hereby established in the state treasury the correctional
2 supervision fund. All moneys credited to the correctional supervision fund
3 shall be used for: (1) The implementation of and training for use of a
4 statewide, mandatory, standardized risk assessment tool or instrument as
5 specified by the Kansas sentencing commission, pursuant to K.S.A. 75-
6 5291, and amendments thereto; (2) the implementation of and training for
7 use of a statewide, mandatory, standardized risk assessment tool or
8 instrument for juveniles adjudicated to be juvenile offenders; and (3)
9 evidence-based adult and juvenile offender supervision programs by
10 judicial branch personnel. If all expenditures for the program have been
11 paid and moneys remain in the correctional supervision fund for a fiscal
12 year, remaining moneys may be expended from the correctional
13 supervision fund to support adult and juvenile offender supervision by
14 court services officers. All expenditures from the correctional supervision
15 fund shall be made in accordance with appropriation acts upon warrants of
16 the director of accounts and reports issued pursuant to vouchers approved
17 by the chief justice of the Kansas supreme court or by a person or persons
18 designated by the chief justice.

19 Sec. 2. K.S.A. 22-2907 is hereby amended to read as follows: 22-
20 2907. (a) After a complaint has been filed charging a defendant with
21 commission of a crime and prior to conviction thereof, and after the
22 district attorney has considered the factors listed in K.S.A. 22-2908, if it
23 appears to the district attorney that diversion of the defendant would be in
24 the interests of justice and of benefit to the defendant and the community,
25 the district attorney may propose a diversion agreement to the defendant.
26 The terms of each diversion agreement shall be established by the district
27 attorney in accordance with K.S.A. 22-2909, and amendments thereto.

28 (b) Each district attorney shall adopt written policies and guidelines
29 for the implementation of a diversion program in accordance with this act.
30 Such policies and guidelines shall provide for a diversion conference and
31 other procedures in those cases where the district attorney elects to offer
32 diversion in lieu of further criminal proceedings on the complaint.

33 (c) Each defendant shall be informed in writing of the diversion
34 program and the policies and guidelines adopted by the district attorney.
35 The district attorney may require any defendant requesting diversion to
36 provide information regarding prior criminal charges, education, work
37 experience and training, family, residence in the community, medical
38 history, including any psychiatric or psychological treatment or
39 counseling, and other information relating to the diversion program. In all
40 cases, the defendant shall be present and shall have the right to be
41 represented by counsel at the diversion conference with the district
42 attorney.

43 (d) (1) A county or district attorney may enter into a memorandum of

1 understanding with the chief judge of a judicial district or community
2 correctional services to assist with supervision and monitoring of persons
3 who have entered into a diversion agreement. The county or district
4 attorney shall retain authority over whether a defendant is given the option
5 to enter into a diversion agreement and whether the defendant's diversion
6 agreement will be revoked.

7 (2) A memorandum of understanding shall include provisions related
8 to:

- 9 (A) Determining the level of supervision needed for a defendant;
- 10 (B) use of a criminal risk-need assessment;
- 11 (C) payment of costs for supervision; and
- 12 (D) waiver of the supervision fee established in this subsection.

13 (3) (A) When a person who has entered into a diversion agreement is
14 supervised pursuant to a memorandum of understanding under this
15 subsection, the person shall pay a supervision fee in the amount
16 established in K.S.A. 21-6607~~(e)(3)(A)~~ (c)(2)(A) for misdemeanor or
17 felony post-conviction supervision, as appropriate for the crime charged.

18 (B) The diversion supervision fee imposed by this paragraph shall be
19 charged and collected by the county or district attorney.

20 (C) All moneys collected pursuant to this section shall be paid into
21 the county general fund and used to fund the costs of diversion supervision
22 performed pursuant to a memorandum of understanding under this
23 subsection.

24 (D) The diversion supervision fee specified by this paragraph may be
25 reduced or waived by the county or district attorney in accordance with a
26 memorandum of understanding under this subsection.

27 (4) When a person who has entered into a diversion agreement is
28 supervised pursuant to a memorandum of understanding under this
29 subsection, the person shall pay the actual costs of any urinalysis testing
30 required as a term of supervision. Payments for urinalysis testing shall be
31 remitted to the county treasurer for deposit in the county general fund. The
32 costs of urinalysis testing may be reduced or waived by the county or
33 district attorney.

34 (5) The office of judicial administration may develop guidelines
35 regarding the content of a memorandum of understanding between a
36 county or district attorney and the chief judge of a judicial district and the
37 administration of a supervision program operating pursuant to such
38 memorandum of understanding.

39 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 22-3717 is hereby amended to read as follows: 22-
40 3717. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section; K.S.A. 1993 Supp.
41 21-4628, prior to its repeal; K.S.A. 21-4624, 21-4635 through 21-4638 and
42 21-4642, prior to their repeal; K.S.A. 21-6617, 21-6620, 21-6623, 21-
43 6624, 21-6625 and 21-6626, and amendments thereto; and K.S.A. 8-1567,

1 and amendments thereto; an inmate, including an inmate sentenced
2 pursuant to K.S.A. 21-4618, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6707, and
3 amendments thereto, shall be eligible for parole after serving the entire
4 minimum sentence imposed by the court, less good time credits.

5 (b) (1) An inmate sentenced to imprisonment for life without the
6 possibility of parole pursuant to K.S.A. 21-6617, and amendments thereto,
7 shall not be eligible for parole.

8 (2) Except as provided by K.S.A. 21-4635 through 21-4638, prior to
9 their repeal, and K.S.A. 21-6620, 21-6623, 21-6624 and 21-6625, and
10 amendments thereto, an inmate sentenced to imprisonment for the crime
11 of: (A) Capital murder committed on or after July 1, 1994, shall be eligible
12 for parole after serving 25 years of confinement, without deduction of any
13 good time credits; (B) murder in the first degree based upon a finding of
14 premeditated murder committed on or after July 1, 1994, but prior to July
15 1, 2014, shall be eligible for parole after serving 25 years of confinement,
16 without deduction of any good time credits; and (C) murder in the first
17 degree as described in K.S.A. 21-5402(a)(2), and amendments thereto,
18 committed on or after July 1, 2014, shall be eligible for parole after
19 serving 25 years of confinement, without deduction of any good time
20 credits.

21 (3) Except as provided by subsections (b)(1), (b)(2) and (b)(5),
22 K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 21-4628, prior to its repeal, K.S.A. 21-4635 through
23 21-4638, prior to their repeal, and K.S.A. 21-6620, 21-6623, 21-6624 and
24 21-6625, and amendments thereto, an inmate sentenced to imprisonment
25 for an off-grid offense committed on or after July 1, 1993, but prior to July
26 1, 1999, shall be eligible for parole after serving 15 years of confinement,
27 without deduction of any good time credits and an inmate sentenced to
28 imprisonment for an off-grid offense committed on or after July 1, 1999,
29 shall be eligible for parole after serving 20 years of confinement without
30 deduction of any good time credits.

31 (4) Except as provided by K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 21-4628, prior to its
32 repeal, an inmate sentenced for a class A felony committed before July 1,
33 1993, including an inmate sentenced pursuant to K.S.A. 21-4618, prior to
34 its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6707, and amendments thereto, shall be eligible for
35 parole after serving 15 years of confinement, without deduction of any
36 good time credits.

37 (5) An inmate sentenced to imprisonment for a violation of K.S.A.
38 21-3402(a), prior to its repeal, committed on or after July 1, 1996, but
39 prior to July 1, 1999, shall be eligible for parole after serving 10 years of
40 confinement without deduction of any good time credits.

41 (6) An inmate sentenced to imprisonment pursuant to K.S.A. 21-
42 4643, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6627, and amendments thereto,
43 committed on or after July 1, 2006, shall be eligible for parole after

1 serving the mandatory term of imprisonment without deduction of any
2 good time credits.

3 (c) (1) Except as provided in subsection (e), if an inmate is sentenced
4 to imprisonment for more than one crime and the sentences run
5 consecutively, the inmate shall be eligible for parole after serving the total
6 of:

7 (A) The aggregate minimum sentences, as determined pursuant to
8 K.S.A. 21-4608, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6606, and amendments
9 thereto, less good time credits for those crimes which are not class A
10 felonies; and

11 (B) an additional 15 years, without deduction of good time credits,
12 for each crime which is a class A felony.

13 (2) If an inmate is sentenced to imprisonment pursuant to K.S.A. 21-
14 4643, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6627, and amendments thereto, for
15 crimes committed on or after July 1, 2006, the inmate shall be eligible for
16 parole after serving the mandatory term of imprisonment.

17 (d) (1) Persons sentenced for crimes, other than off-grid crimes,
18 committed on or after July 1, 1993, or persons subject to subparagraph
19 (G), will not be eligible for parole, but will be released to a mandatory
20 period of postrelease supervision upon completion of the prison portion of
21 their sentence as follows:

22 (A) Except as provided in subparagraphs (D) and (E), persons
23 sentenced for nondrug severity levels 1 through 4 crimes, drug severity
24 levels 1 and 2 crimes committed on or after July 1, 1993, but prior to July
25 1, 2012, and drug severity levels 1, 2 and 3 crimes committed on or after
26 July 1, 2012, must serve 36 months on postrelease supervision.

27 (B) Except as provided in subparagraphs (D) and (E), persons
28 sentenced for nondrug severity levels 5 and 6 crimes, drug severity level 3
29 crimes committed on or after July 1, 1993, but prior to July 1, 2012, and
30 drug severity level 4 crimes committed on or after July 1, 2012, must serve
31 24 months on postrelease supervision.

32 (C) Except as provided in subparagraphs (D) and (E), persons
33 sentenced for nondrug severity levels 7 through 10 crimes, drug severity
34 level 4 crimes committed on or after July 1, 1993, but prior to July 1,
35 2012, and drug severity level 5 crimes committed on or after July 1, 2012,
36 must serve 12 months on postrelease supervision.

37 (D) Persons sentenced to a term of imprisonment that includes a
38 sentence for a sexually violent crime as defined in K.S.A. 22-3717, and
39 amendments thereto, committed on or after July 1, 1993, but prior to July
40 1, 2006, a sexually motivated crime in which the offender has been
41 ordered to register pursuant to K.S.A. 22-3717(d)(1)(D)(vii), and
42 amendments thereto, electronic solicitation, K.S.A. 21-3523, prior to its
43 repeal, or K.S.A. 21-5509, and amendments thereto, or unlawful sexual

1 relations, K.S.A. 21-3520, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-5512, and
2 amendments thereto, shall serve the period of postrelease supervision as
3 provided in subsections (d)(1)(A), (d)(1)(B) or (d)(1)(C), plus the amount
4 of good time and program credit earned and retained pursuant to K.S.A.
5 21-4722, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6821, and amendments thereto,
6 on postrelease supervision.

7 (i) If the sentencing judge finds substantial and compelling reasons to
8 impose a departure based upon a finding that the current crime of
9 conviction was sexually motivated, departure may be imposed to extend
10 the postrelease supervision to a period of up to 60 months.

11 (ii) If the sentencing judge departs from the presumptive postrelease
12 supervision period, the judge shall state on the record at the time of
13 sentencing the substantial and compelling reasons for the departure.
14 Departures in this section are subject to appeal pursuant to K.S.A. 21-
15 4721, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6820, and amendments thereto.

16 (iii) In determining whether substantial and compelling reasons exist,
17 the court shall consider:

18 (a) Written briefs or oral arguments submitted by either the defendant
19 or the state;

20 (b) any evidence received during the proceeding;

21 (c) the presentence report, the victim's impact statement and any
22 psychological evaluation as ordered by the court pursuant to K.S.A. 21-
23 4714(e), prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6813(e), and amendments thereto;
24 and

25 (d) any other evidence the court finds trustworthy and reliable.

26 (iv) The sentencing judge may order that a psychological evaluation
27 be prepared and the recommended programming be completed by the
28 offender. The department of corrections or the prisoner review board shall
29 ensure that court ordered sex offender treatment be carried out.

30 (v) In carrying out the provisions of subsection (d)(1)(D), the court
31 shall refer to K.S.A. 21-4718, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6817, and
32 amendments thereto.

33 (vi) Upon petition and payment of any restitution ordered pursuant to
34 K.S.A. 21-6604, and amendments thereto, the prisoner review board may
35 provide for early discharge from the postrelease supervision period
36 imposed pursuant to subsection (d)(1)(D)(i) upon completion of court
37 ordered programs and completion of the presumptive postrelease
38 supervision period, as determined by the crime of conviction, pursuant to
39 subsection (d)(1)(A), (d)(1)(B) or (d)(1)(C). Early discharge from
40 postrelease supervision is at the discretion of the board.

41 (vii) Persons convicted of crimes deemed sexually violent or sexually
42 motivated shall be registered according to the offender registration act,
43 K.S.A. 22-4901 through 22-4910, and amendments thereto.

1 (viii) Persons convicted of K.S.A. 21-3510 or 21-3511, prior to their
2 repeal, or K.S.A. 21-5508, and amendments thereto, shall be required to
3 participate in a treatment program for sex offenders during the postrelease
4 supervision period.

5 (E) The period of postrelease supervision provided in subparagraphs
6 (A) and (B) may be reduced by up to 12 months and the period of
7 postrelease supervision provided in subparagraph (C) may be reduced by
8 up to six months based on the offender's compliance with conditions of
9 supervision and overall performance while on postrelease supervision. The
10 reduction in the supervision period shall be on an earned basis pursuant to
11 rules and regulations adopted by the secretary of corrections.

12 (F) In cases where sentences for crimes from more than one severity
13 level have been imposed, the offender shall serve the longest period of
14 postrelease supervision as provided by this section available for any crime
15 upon which sentence was imposed irrespective of the severity level of the
16 crime. Supervision periods will not aggregate.

17 (G) (i) Except as provided in subsection ~~(u)~~(v), persons sentenced to
18 imprisonment for a sexually violent crime committed on or after July 1,
19 2006, when the offender was 18 years of age or older, and who are
20 released from prison, shall be released to a mandatory period of
21 postrelease supervision for the duration of the person's natural life.

22 (ii) Persons sentenced to imprisonment for a sexually violent crime
23 committed on or after the effective date of this act, when the offender was
24 under 18 years of age, and who are released from prison, shall be released
25 to a mandatory period of postrelease supervision for 60 months, plus the
26 amount of good time and program credit earned and retained pursuant to
27 K.S.A. 21-4722, prior to its repeal, or K.S.A. 21-6821, and amendments
28 thereto.

29 (2) Persons serving a period of postrelease supervision pursuant to
30 subsections (d)(1)(A), (d)(1)(B) or (d)(1)(C) may petition the prisoner
31 review board for early discharge. Upon payment of restitution, the prisoner
32 review board may provide for early discharge.

33 (3) Persons serving a period of incarceration for a supervision
34 violation shall not have the period of postrelease supervision modified
35 until such person is released and returned to postrelease supervision.
