## SUPPLEMENTAL NOTE ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2491

As Amended by House Committee on Judiciary

## **Brief\***

HB 2491, as amended, would provide that when a small claims action falls within the scope of the Tort Claims Act, a lawyer may appear in such action on behalf of any governmental entity, officer, or employee for the sole purpose of filing and arguing a motion to dismiss for lack of jurisdiction.

## **Background**

In the House Judiciary Committee, a representative of the Office of the Attorney General appeared in support of the bill, explaining that, on occasion, *pro se* plaintiffs will file suit in small claims court against state employees for actions taken in the course of their employment. Although these claims fall under the Tort Claims Act, which prohibits such claims from being brought under the Small Claims Procedure Act, the representative stated the employees must still appear and defend against the suit. Further, because lawyers are prohibited from appearing in small claim court and motions to dismiss are not allowed, he explained the Office of the Attorney General cannot appear for the employee or request the suit be dismissed. The bill is the Office's proposed solution to this issue.

The House Committee amended the bill to clarify a lawyer only may appear to file and argue the motion to dismiss.
