residents has faced many obstacles, but one that remains an ongoing challenge is meeting the needs for emergency medical service workers and emergency medical service volunteers. Meade County is not alone in facing this challenge; rural Kansas and rural emergency medical services across the country are experiencing critical shortages of paid and volunteer-trained emergency medical service personnel. There is an emergency medical service workforce shortage in many states, and this is most
