Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 1608

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the adoption of a student bill of rights.

WHEREAS, Elementary and secondary students across the state of Kansas deserve a high quality education from engaged teachers without interference from outside groups. The state of Kansas can provide such an education by adopting a student bill of rights; and

WHEREAS, Parents, teachers, citizens of the state, local school boards, the state board of education, the state legislature and the federal government all have a role to play in our K-12 public education system. The student bill of rights should be a promise by each such entity to ensure that all Kansas elementary and secondary students receive a well-rounded education from high quality teachers in a safe educational environment; and

WHEREAS, Local school boards have a responsibility to the students and employees of their district. Local school boards should meet that responsibility by: (1) Relying on quality educational research from credible sources when proposing changes to curriculum or local policies; (2) using existing processes to curate and maintain school libraries and book collections without interference; (3) seeking student and teacher perspectives in making decisions for the school district by including a student representative and a teacher representative on such local school boards; and (4) hiring and retaining more healthcare professionals, school counselors, school social workers and school psychologists to address the increasing mental health needs of students and school district employees; and

WHEREAS, In addition to satisfying its financial obligations under section 6 of article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, the state legislature should do more than the minimum for our students by also providing free meals to all students enrolled in and attending elementary or secondary schools in this state and ensuring full funding for special education and related services at the 92% statewide excess cost amount. To attract and retain well-trained and committed teachers and other school staff for our students, the legislature should provide enough funding to increase the salaries of such teachers and other school staff. The legislature should also ensure that any private school or organization

that receives public assistance, including vouchers, scholarships, tax credits or other public assistance, should be required to adhere to the same accrediting, assessment and transparency requirements that public schools adhere to, otherwise, such public assistance programs should be discontinued; and

WHEREAS, The state legislature should enact policies that addresses the needs and concerns of our school boards, administrators, teachers, parents and students. In order to better understand such needs and concerns, legislators should spend at least two days per year as a volunteer in a public school in this state. Additionally, the legislature should require every K-12 education bill to have input from at least six current educators from various geographic regions of the state prior to its introduction and prohibit out-of-state special interest groups from requesting introduction of K-12 education bills; and

WHEREAS, Parents and teachers should foster a mutually beneficial and respectful partnership in the education of our children. At the beginning of each school year, parents should communicate their plans for setting expectations with their children for the timely and effective completion of assignments, class projects, test preparation and other school work. Parents should also seek opportunities to become partners in education by joining school organizations and volunteering at their child's school; and

WHEREAS, A safe educational environment is paramount to the success of all of our students, teachers, staff and educational entities at all levels of government. Common sense health and safety measures based on the research and recommendations of experts should be put into place to protect our students and school district employees from social media harassment, doxxing, verbal and physical abuse, shaming, disease outbreaks and any other unacceptable behaviors. Teachers should not be forced to carry firearms in their classrooms, and school resource officers should receive comprehensive training, including bias training. The focus in an educational environment should be on learning, and that can only happen when everyone feels safe and respected in such environment: Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Representatives concurring therein: That the Kansas legislature urges every educational entity in this state, including local school boards, the state board, and the legislature, and federal educational entities to adopt a student bill of rights that would protect the educational interests of our children; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State shall send an enrolled copy of this resolution to Senator Holscher.
