Prison Bed Impact Assessment, SB 394 Discharge of Certain Offenders Prior to

Transport to Department of Corrections

### SUMMARY OF THE BILL

SB 394 would amend the authority of the Secretary of Corrections to discharge an offender if the
offender has 20 days rather than 10 days remaining to be served on the prison portion of the sentence
at the time the Department of Corrections (DOC) receives notice of an order of commitment.

### **KEY ASSUMPTIONS**

- The target population of this bill includes any offender who has a sentence left to serve of 20 days or less will not be admitted to DOC.
- Projected admission to prison for the target offender is assumed to increase by an annual average of 2%, which is the same percentage used in relation to the baseline prison population forecast produced in August 2011 by the Kansas Sentencing Commission.
- It is assumed that the effective date is on July 1, 2012.

#### **EINDINGS**

- In FY 2011, 117 offenders who had a sentence length left to serve of 20 days or less were admitted to DOC. Of this number,
  - 96 (82.1%) were new court commitment and
  - o 21 (17.9%) were probation condition violators.

# IMPACT OF THE BILL

- Impact on prison admissions: The amendment of this bill would reduce 117 prison admissions in FY 2013 and 140 prison admissions in FY 2022.
- Impact on prison beds: The amendments of this bill would save four beds in FY 2013 and five beds in FY 2022.
- **Impact on workload of the Commission:** This bill would have no impact on the workload of journal entry of the Commission.
