I feel a personal gratitude to integrated schools in Kansas.

From 1904 to 1919, my grandmother Lula Preston and siblings attended an integrated one-room school in Rooks County. African-Americans from Nicodemus who had settled in Rooks, German, Czech, Jewish and French immigrants made District #84 "Mt. Pleasant" an unusually ethnically diverse school. As Clerk, Lula's father W.W. Preston hand-wrote annual school reports for many years. He was followed by Mr. D.J. Green, African-American parent of Annie and Hazel Green. Mr. Green's handwriting was even more beautiful than my great-grandfather's. My grandmother and her two sisters graduated from Stockton high school along with the Misses Green and other African-American schoolmates. Lula taught for four years in Rooks County, along with her sisters.

Without doubt, Lula Preston Ford's early education fostered not just tolerance but a predisposition to kindness, friendship and justice in her descendants. I am grateful that Kansas will honor the tradition of educational justice and fairness with a mural at the Capitol. I hope that real people, not mythologized place-holders will be depicted in this worthy historical art.
