

Written Testimony in Support of Senate Bill 126 House Children & Seniors Committee Tuesday, March 14, 2017

Chairman Alford and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in support of Senate Bill 126, which will update Kansas background check requirements for child care providers, in compliance with the new federal law passed in 2014.

As the largest provider of child care programs in Kansas, the YMCAs of Kansas feel this bill falls directly in line with our organization's clear, compelling and demonstrated commitment to keeping kids safe. The Kansas State Alliance of YMCAs represents the collective voice and impact of 10 Kansas Y Associations serving 33 communities and 557,000 Kansans all throughout the state. Our charitable work strengthens communities by advancing the goals of youth development, healthy living and social responsibility.

Although the YMCA has always identified child safety and child abuse prevention as a priority, we recognize that there is a need to continuously enhance the safety, prevention and training procedures of all Kansas child care facilities. This bill would do just that by expanding the list of prohibitions for those interacting with childcare facilities to include any individual that has been convicted or adjudicated of a crime that requires registration as a sex offender under the Kansas offender registration act, as a sex offender in another state, or as a sex offender on the national sex offender registry. The bill would also expand the prohibition against individuals listed on the child abuse and neglect registry maintained by the Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF) to include individuals listed on the child abuse and neglect registry maintained by any other state or the federal government.

This bill is a proactive approach to child safety that allows child care facilities such as the YMCA to more effectively serve our communities and make our facilities, programs and services safer. We urge your support of Senate Bill 126.
