AN ACT concerning the state corporation commission; requiring the commission to study certain issues relating to electric utilities.

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WHEREAS, Kansas experienced the fourth largest increase in electric rates in the country from 2008 through 2014 at 34.8% and has gone from the 13th to the 34th lowest-cost provider of electricity in the country; and

WHEREAS, These developments have led to a negative impact on industry development and state tax revenues; and

WHEREAS, Numerous changes have taken place in the electric industry since the last Kansas energy report was issued in 2009 and it is time, in addition to a review of the merits of retail choice, for a comprehensive review of various issues and norms in the state's utility rules.

Now, therefore:

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

- Section 1. The state corporation commission shall open a docket and issue a final order prior to January 1, 2018, to determine:
- (a) The effectiveness of current rates and costs of Kansas utilities with findings and analysis upon:
- (1) The effectiveness of rate of return as the primary measure when evaluating current and proposed rate changes;
- (2) rate and cost comparisons among Kansas utilities and their retail sales impact;
- (3) whether current and proposed rate structures unfairly discriminate against one or more classes of electric customers when compared to national norms:
- (4) the potential impact of economic development rates on consumer sales;
- (5) the ratepayer impact of current and future pension and retirement plan obligations of utilities;
- (6) the costs incurred by a utility to build and operate charging stations and any associated costs incurred by ratepayers;
- (7) the costs incurred by a utility to hire or employ lobbyists and any associated costs incurred by ratepayers; and
- (8) any donations and contributions to charitable, civic and social organizations made by utilities and whether there is any impact upon

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 ratepayers due to such donations and contributions.

- (b) The application of certain commission and utility policies and whether those policies improve electric service or benefit retail electric customers, including, but not limited to:
- (1) Utility bylaws that exclude certain customers from board membership;
- (2) commission policies allowing commissioners and employees to accept positions on a governing body of a utility or as an employee of a utility in a managerial, professional or consulting capacity following employment with the commission;
- (3) policies that limit out-of-state travel expenses incurred by the commission or commission staff;
 - (4) policies relating to time delays for late fees;
- (5) polices relating to expenses incurred by the commission or commission staff to travel to a utility's principal place of business that is located in another state;
- (6) policies relating to eligibility for current and future commissioners;
 - (7) policies relating to citizens' utility ratepayer board; and
- (8) any other policies or electric service issues deemed appropriate at the discretion of the commission.
- (c) No later than January 1, 2018, the commission shall issue a final order with all findings that are required by this section.
- Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.
