I am a life long Kansan. I love this state and so many of the the things it stands for. But I have concerns about the future, which is why I'm writing to you.

As a Kansan, and as an American, I am against vaccine mandates. This is a growing issue around the world. I hope you have a chance to research into it and learn more.
