Chairman Barker and members of the Federal and State Affairs Committee,

I want to thank you for the consideration given to this very important and crucial proposal. Why did I not enroll in college? Why did a I remain in a job that did not pay enough when I had the potential to offer so much more to my community? Now I would like you to consider asking why not?

I will end with a humble request to you, Chairman Barker and members of the Federal and State Committee, to approve and move our great State of Kansas forward with HB2003.
