RE: Testimony in <u>SUPPORT</u> of HB 2045 – Angel Tax Credit Adjustment and Extenstion

Chairman Tarwater & Members of the Committee:

As a dedicated serial entrepreneur and angel investor (not one who has participated in this program), I come before you to rise in support of HB 2045. This bill stands to renew one of the very few authorized programs that have a direct impact on entrepreneurial start-ups in Kansas.

Investing in start-ups is very risky. It is a well-known fact that more than 90%¹ of start-ups fail. Yet, small businesses make up 99.7% of US Employers and represent 64% of net new-private sector employment². Nationwide in 2020, there were 3,114,111 new jobs created by 804,398 start-up businesses³.

Kansas has 254,297 small businesses which represents 99.1% of ALL Kansas business. Combined, they employ 604,215 people which represents 51% of the private workforce⁴.

The Kansas Angels Investment Tax credit has been a vital part of the new business development in Kansas. Remember, you don't start with tax credit. Many of the individuals who utilize this program have already invested much of their own resources or leveraged their own assets to get this far.

Kansas recently ranked 6th in outward migration of our population. Data shows instances of businesses choosing Kansas over other states to start their company as a result of this offering. This program truly shows entrepreneurs that Kansas is willing to invest in them if they are willing to do their part.

I urge you to do your part by supporting this bill. Let us send a message to the rest of the nation and let them know that Kansas is a place for brilliant minds!



Overall Kansas Economy

- In the third quarter of 2018, Kansas grew at an annual rate of 2.3%, which was slower than the overall US growth rate of 3.4%. Kansas's 2017 growth rate of 0.2% was down from the 2016 rate of 2.2%. (Source: BEA)
- In February 2019, the unemployment rate was 3.4%, down from 3.5% in February 2018. This was below the February 2019 national unemployment rate of 3.8%. (Source: CPS)

Employment



- Kansas small businesses employed 604,215 people, or 51.0% of the private workforce, in 2016. (Source: SUSB)
- Firms with fewer than 100 employees have the largest share of small business employment. Figure 1 provides further details on firms with employees. (Source: SUSB)
- Private-sector employment increased 0.7% during the 12month period ending in February 2019. This was above the increase of 0.3% during the prior 12-month period. (Source: CPS)
- The number of proprietors increased in 2017 by 1.9% relative to the previous year. (Source: BEA)
- Small businesses created 9,106 net jobs in 2016. Firms employing fewer than 20 employees experienced the largest gains, adding 6,898 net jobs. The largest losses were in firms employing 20 to 99 employees, which lost 1,577 net jobs. (Source: SUSB)

The Small Business Profiles are produced by the US Small Business Administration's Office of Advocacy (http://advocacy.sba.gov). Each report incorporates the most up-to-date government data to present a unique snapshot of small businesses. Small businesses are defined for this profile as firms employing fewer than 500 employees. Net small business job change, employees of minority-owned businesses, and exporter share statistics are based on the 2016 Statistics of US Businesses (SUSB), 2016 Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs (ASE), and 2016 International Trade Administration (ITA) data, respectively.

Income and Finance

- The number of banks decreased by 17 between June 2016 and June 2017 to 252 banks. (Source: FDIC)
- In 2017, 37,201 loans under \$100,000 (valued at \$534.8 million) were issued by Kansas lending institutions reporting under the Community Reinvestment Act. (Source: FFIEC)
- The median income for individuals self-employed at their own incorporated businesses was \$48,470 in 2017. For individuals self-employed at their own unincorporated firms, this figure was \$24,974. (Source: ACS)

Median income represents earnings from all sources. Unincorporated self-employment income includes unpaid family workers, a very small percent of the unincorporated self-employed.

Figure 2 shows the average number of employees per employer business by owner's demographic group according to the 2016 Annual Survey of Entrepreneurs (ASE). Unshaded bars display US values; data were withheld because they do not meet Census Bureau publication standards or could disclose information regarding individual businesses.

Turnover among Establishments with Employees

Figure 3: Kansas Quarterly Startups and Exits

 In the third guarter of 2017, 1,905 establishments started up, generating 6,879 new jobs in Kansas. Startups are counted when business establishments hire at least one employee for the first time. (Source: BDM)

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- In the same period, 1,731 establishments exited resulting in 6,617 jobs lost. Exits occur when establishments go from having at least one employee to having none, and then remain closed for at least one year. (Source: BDM)
- Figure 3 displays quarterly startups and exits from 1993 to 2017. Each series is smoothed across multiple quarters to highlight long-run trends. (Source: BDM)

The BLS data covers only business establishments with employees. BLS refers to startups as births and exits as deaths. These terms are distinct from the BLS openings and closings categories. Openings include seasonal re-openings and closings include seasonal shutterings. Quarterly startup and exit values may not align with Figure 3 due to smoothing.

International Trade

• A total of 3,190 companies exported goods from Kansas in 2016. Of these, 2,644, or 82.9%, were small firms; they generated 27.6% of Kansas's \$8.4 billion in total exports. (Source: ITA)




Figure 4: Kansas Self-Employment Rates by County, 2017





Table 2: Kansas Small Businesses by Industry and Firm Size, 2016

Figure 4 provides estimates of the rate of self-employment among employed civilians, 16 years and over, including both incorporated and unincorporated businesses, from the 2017 American Community Survey (ACS).
