Testimony in Support of HB 2711 & HB 2720 House Taxation

Chairman Smith and Members of the House Taxation Committee:

The Kansas Food and Farm Coalition (FFC) supports HB 2711 and HB 2720. Kansas FFC is a group of long-standing nonprofit organizations concerned about our food system—from farm to fork. Coalition members include KC Healthy Kids, the Kansas Food Action Network, the Kansas Rural Center, and Harvesters. Our coalition works to support policies that assist small and mid-sized farms, increase production and sales of locally grown foods, increase access to healthy food for all, and reduce food insecurity in our communities. Both HB 2711 and HB 2720 are helpful in working toward those goals. While there are merits to both bills, we appreciate the more immediate implementation date in HB 2720 of August 1st, 2022. On the other hand, we support the continuation of the refundability of the food sales tax credit in HB 2711 until the state rate is reduced to 0%. The refundability of the sales tax credit is especially crucial for lower income families who spend a higher percentage of their income on food. Further, in the absence of any immediate reform on eliminating the state sales tax on food, we would support the three-year gradual reduction.

As a regressive tax, the state sales tax on food impacts our most vulnerable Kansas families who are trying to make ends meet. Passage of either of these bills would help increase food access and security while providing a modest level of relief to Kansas children and families. An element not included in either of these bills, but that we believe is of great importance for small farmers, producers, and grocers, is language eliminating the sales tax at farmers markets. This is a small measure benefiting not only consumers, but also relives some burden and barriers for small-scale producers as they seek to sell their products.

Both of these proposals are a great step toward prosperity for Kansas families, farmers, and grocers. For these reasons we ask you to support the policies outlined in these bills. Thank you for your consideration and I welcome any questions at the appropriate time.

 - o Remove the restriction on the SNAP time limit waiver for able-bodied adults without dependents (ABAWD waiver).
 - Remove the ban on SNAP for drug felons.
- Support local food procurement and promotion. In particular:
 - o Increase funding for and participation in the Kansas Department of Education Farm to School Program.
 - o Identify opportunities to build upon the USDA Farm to Food Bank program with state support.
