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House Concurrent Resolution No. 5008

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A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION urging the Congress of the United
 States to provide funding to the United States Army Corps of Engi neers to study reallocation of storage space from the flood control pool
 to the conservation pool in John Redmond Lake in Coffey County,
 Kansas [and memorializing the Congress of the United States re garding the high cost of prescription drugs].

[Section 1.] WHEREAS, The United States Army Corps of Engineers constructed John Redmond Dam on the Neosho River in Coffey
County, Kansas, for the purposes of flood control, water supply, water
quality, recreation and fish and wildlife; and

WHEREAS, The State of Kansas signed contracts with the United States Army Corps of Engineers in 1975 and 1996 for the purchase of all available water supply storage space in the conservation pool of John Redmond Lake; and

WHEREAS, The State of Kansas has signed contracts with users for
water supply from storage space in the conservation pool of John Redmond Lake; and

WHEREAS, Article 1 paragraph (f) of federal contract DACW56-75-28 29 C-0029 and Article 1 paragraph (e) (1) of federal contract DACW56-96-30 WS-0003 both indicate sedimentation surveys will be completed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers "at intervals not to exceed fifteen 31 32 (15) years", and when "the findings of such survey indicate any Project 33 purpose will be affected by unanticipated sediment distribution, there shall be an equitable redistribution of the sediment reserve storage space 34 35 among the purposes served by the Project including" industrial and municipal water supply; and 36

WHEREAS, Hydrographic surveys of John Redmond Lake indicate
that the conservation pool, and corresponding water supply storage space,
is filling with sediment faster than was estimated during design of the
lake: and

41 WHEREAS, Surveys of the storage contained in John Redmond Lake 42 indicate sediment is entering the flood control pool more slowly than

43 estimated during the design of the lake; and

1 WHEREAS, A reallocation of storage from the flood control pool to 2 the conservation pool would allow for a more equitable distribution of 3 storage and sediment between the pools and allow the State of Kansas to 4 meet the needs of users for a longer period of time: Now, therefore,

5 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas, 6 the Senate concurring therein: That the Legislature of the State of Kan-7 sas urges the Congress of the United States to provide funding to the 8 United States Army Corps of Engineers to study reallocating storage 9 space from the flood control pool to the conservation pool in John Red-10 mond Lake in Coffey County, Kansas; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State is directed to send 11 12 enrolled copies of this resolution to the President of the United States, George W. Bush; the Chairman of the United States Senate Energy and 13 Water Development Subcommittee, c/o Committee on Appropriations, 14 15 United States Senate, S-128, The Capitol, Washington, D.C. 20510; the Chairman of the United States House of Representatives Energy and 16 Water Development Subcommittee, 2362 Rayburn House Office Build-17 ing, Washington, D.C. 20515-6020; and each member of the Kansas Con-18 19 gressional Delegation.

20 [Sec. 2. WHEREAS, Sales of prescription drugs are expected 21 to exceed more than \$100 billion this year, and of some 55 million Americans many are paying the entire amount for their prescription 2223 drugs out-of-pocket. Total spending on prescription drugs has in-24 creased an average of 12.2% annually since 1993, of which 2.6% is 25 the average in product price increases, 5.8% is attributable to in-26 creases in utilization and 3.8% because of new products and ther-27 apies, while the consumer price index has increased an average of 2.6% and the average increase for health-care expenditures has 28 been 5.1%. The average cost of new drugs introduced since 1992 is 29 30 \$71.49, more than twice the average price of \$30.47 for previously 31 existing drugs. As President Clinton has stated, "In a nation burst-32 ing with prosperity, no senior should have to choose between buying food and buying medicine." President Bush has declared prescrip-33 tion drug costs a priority and has proposed that medicare provide 34 35 subsidies to help seniors purchase prescription drugs from competing private insurers and would commit \$48 billion for state grants 36 37 in the first four years of the program; and

38 [WHEREAS, Pharmaceutical manufacturers spent an estimated 39 \$1.2 billion in 2000 for direct to consumer advertising. While ad-40 vertising helps educate patients and encourages patient participa-41 tion in their own health decisions, such advertising tends to increase

42 utilization of pharmaceutical products and health care costs; and

43 [WHEREAS, While drug manufacturers provide discounts in ex-

cess of 50% to "preferred buyers", community retail pharmacies
 receive only nominal volume discounts resulting in the general pub lic paying more for their prescription medication; and

[WHEREAS, The pharmaceutical industry spends about 20% of its revenues on research and development, compared to 4% in other industries, with such costs being absorbed mainly by Americans. Unlike some foreign countries, the United States has not chosen to impose price controls on prescription drugs; and

[WHEREAS, The surge of prescription drug sales on the Internet 10 and through "mail order pharmacies" reflects an attempt by con-11 sumers to obtain needed drugs from any source, domestic or foreign, 12 which may place consumers at risk and result in overall poor health 13 outcomes: Now, therefore,

14[Be it resolved by the Senate of the State of Kansas, the House of Rep-15resentatives concurring therein: That we memorialize the Congress16of the United States regarding the high cost of prescription drugs17to individual consumers and the need for assistance and relief from18this circumstance: and

19 [Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State be directed to 20 provide an enrolled copy of this resolution to the President pro tem-21 pore of the United States Senate, to the Speaker of the United States 22 House of Representatives and to each member of the Kansas Con-23 gressional Delegation.]
