Williams 9 10 2-2111 12 A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION memorializing the Congress of the 13 United States to propose an amendment to the Constitution of the 14 United States to permit voluntary school prayer and other public re-15ligious speech. 16 WHEREAS, Our country was founded on the precepts of freedom, 1718 liberty and the right of the people to acknowledge God according to the 19 dictates of their conscience; and 20 WHEREAS, From the very beginning of our nation to the founding 21of our first national government in 1774, and from the Continental Con-22 gress to the Constitutional Convention and the years after the establish-23 ment of our Constitution, voluntary prayer has been a unifying and con-24soling force; and 25WHEREAS, Statements of belief in a supreme power and the virtue 26 of seeking guidance, strength and protection from that power are prev-27 alent throughout our national history and appear in our national documents as well as in virtually every state constitution; and 2829 WHEREAS, The framers of the Constitution, recognizing free exer-30 cise of religion as an inalienable right, secured its protection with the 31 First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States; and 32 WHEREAS, Every session of Congress and of many other legislative and public bodies across the nation begins with the comfort and encour-33 agement of voluntary prayer; and 34 35 WHEREAS, Our government has a constitutional obligation to protect 36 religious freedom; and 37 WHEREAS, One of the purposes of education is to prepare students 38 to be good citizens; and WHEREAS, Instilling an appreciation and respect not only for the 39 40 beliefs and traditions of others but also for the longstanding beliefs and traditions of the nation forms a part of good citizenship; and 41 42 WHEREAS, Voluntary student prayer formed a part of American pub-43 lic schools from their origination in 1642 and for over three hundred years

1	until the United States Supreme Court, in a 1962 ruling it said was "with-
2	out precedent," struck down what it described as "voluntary, nondenom-
3	inational school prayer"; and
4	WHEREAS, In 1985 the United States Supreme Court even struck
5	down voluntary, silent student prayers; and
6	WHEREAS, An increasing number of recent religion-hostile court de-
7	cisions now prohibit the overwhelming majority of Americans from par-
8	ticipating in the very same religious expressions their parents, grandpar-

9 ents and generations before them enjoyed; and

WHEREAS, An overwhelming majority of Americans now favor giving
specific protections to these traditional religious expressions: Now,
therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Kansas,
the Senate concurring therein: That the Kansas Legislature urges the
United States Congress to propose an amendment to the Constitution
reinstating protection for voluntary school prayer and other public religious speech; and

Be it further resolved: That the Secretary of State provide enrolled 19 copies of this resolution to the President of the United States Senate, the 20 Speaker of the United States House of Representatives and to each mem-21 ber of the Kansas legislative delegation.
