10AN ACT concerning lead poisoning; [relating to notification and reporting; amending K.S.A. 65-1,202 and repealing the existing 11 12section; also] repealing the sunset provision of K.S.A. 65-1,214. 13 14Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas: 15[Section 1. K.S.A. 65-1,202 is hereby amended to read as fol-16lows: 65-1,202. The secretary shall administer the provisions of the 17residential childhood lead poisoning prevention act. In adminis-18tering the provisions of the residential childhood lead poisoning 19 prevention act, the secretary shall be authorized to: 20[(a) Develop and implement a childhood lead poisoning pre-21vention program as necessary to protect the health of the children 22 of Kansas, which may include provisions to: 23 Investigate the extent of childhood lead poisoning in [(1)]24 Kansas; 25 $\left[(2) \right]$ develop a data management system designed to collect and 26 analyze information on childhood lead poisoning; 27[(3) develop and conduct programs to educate health care pro-28viders regarding the magnitude and severity of and the necessary 29responses to lead poisoning in Kansas; 30 [(4) issue recommendations for the methods and intervals for 31 blood lead screening and testing of children, taking into account 32 recommendations by the United States centers for disease control 33 and prevention, except that no child shall be screened or tested if 34 the child's parent or guardian objects in writing on the ground that 35 such screening or testing is contrary to the parent's or guardian's 36 religious beliefs and practices; 37 [(5) develop and issue health advisories urging health care pro-38 viders to conduct blood lead screening of children; 39 [(6) encourage health care providers to ensure that parents and guardians of children are advised of the availability and ad-4041visability of screening and testing for lead poisoning; 42 $\left[(7) \right]$ develop a program to assist local health departments in 43 identification and follow-up of cases of elevated blood lead levels 1 in children and other high-risk individuals; and

2 [(8) in consultation with appropriate federal, state and local 3 agencies, develop a comprehensive public education program re-4 garding environmental lead exposures and lead poisoning by:

5 [(A) Identifying appropriate target groups that are in a position 6 to prevent lead poisoning or reduce the number of children who 7 are exposed to lead;

8 [(B) assessing the information needed for each of the target 9 groups and determine the best means of educating the members 10 of each target groups; and

11 [(C) disseminating the information to the target groups in an 12 effective manner.

13 [(b) adopt rules and regulations necessary for the administra-14tion of the residential childhood lead poisoning prevention act in-15cluding, but not limited to, licensure of business entities and public 16 agencies, certification of individuals, accreditation of training pro-17grams, on-site inspections and requirements, notification and rec-18ord keeping, procedures and work practice standards relating to 19 lead-based paint activities as are necessary to protect the public 20health and safety. The secretary shall not require notification to the 21department of health and environment of blood lead level test results less 22 than 10 micrograms per deciliter for persons less than 18 years of age, 23 and less than 25 micrograms per deciliter for persons 18 years of age or 24 older or of any blood lead level test results which are less than level that 25the department determines is suggestive of blood lead levels that are sig-26*nificant from a public health standpoint;*

27(c) adopt by rules and regulations a reasonable schedule of 28 fees for the issuance and renewal of certificates and licenses, train-29ing program accreditations and on-site inspections. The fees shall 30 be periodically increased or decreased consistent with the need to 31 cover the direct and indirect costs to administer the program. At 32 no time shall such fees exceed those charged by the United States 33 environmental protection agency for the same or similar regula-34 tory programs. The fees shall be based upon the amount of reve-35 nue determined by the secretary to be required for proper admin-36 istration of the provisions of the residential childhood lead 37 poisoning prevention act. State and local health department per-38 sonnel certifying for the purpose of environmental investigation 39 of lead poisoned children shall be exempted from licensure fees; 40 [(d) conduct on-site inspections of procedures being utilized by

a licensee during an actual abatement project and conduct inspec-tion of the records pertaining to the residential childhood lead

43 poisoning prevention act;

1 [(e) adopt rules and regulations regarding the distribution of lead hazard information to owners and occupants of housing prior 2 3 to conducting renovation activities in housing; 4[(f) develop rules and regulations to control and disposition $\mathbf{5}$ and reuse of architectural debris that contains lead-based paint.] 6 Section 1. [Sec. 2] K.S.A. [65-1,202 and] 65-1,214 is [are] hereby 7 repealed. 8 Sec. 2. [3.] This act shall take effect and be in force from and after 9 its publication in the statute book.
