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9	AN ACT relating to health care; concerning self-medication by students
10	in secondary schools.
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12	Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:
13	Section 1. This act shall be known and cited as the Kansas student
14	self-medication act also known as Bella's act.
15	Sec. 2. As used in this act:
16	(a) "Anaphylaxis" means a potentially life-threatening hypersensitiv-
17	ity to a substance. Symptoms may include shortness of breath, wheezing,
18	difficulty breathing, difficulty talking, difficulty swallowing, hives, itching,
19	swelling, shock or asthma. Its causes may include an insect sting, food
20	allergy, drug reaction and exercise.
21	(b) "Anaphylactic shock" means an often severe and fatal systemic
22	anaphylaxis reaction in an individual who has shown a previous hypersen-
23	sitivity upon exposure to a specific substance or allergin.
24	(c) "Epinephrine auto-injector" means a disposable drug delivery sys-
25	tem that is designed for emergency administration of epinephrine to pro-
26	vide rapid, convenient first-aid for persons suffering a potentially fatal
27	anaphylactic reaction as defined in subsections (a) and (b) of this section.
28	(d) "Medication" means a medicine prescribed by (1) a physician li-
29	censed to practice medicine, (2) a physician assistant or (3) an advanced
30	registered nurse practitioner who is authorized to prescribe medicine for
31	the treatment of asthma and anaphylactic shock as defined in subsections
32	(a) and (b) of this section.
33	Sec. 3. (a) A student in grades 6 through 12 who has asthma or al-
34	lergies which may require the emergency use of asthma medication or an
35	epinephrine auto-injector or similar device may possess, carry and self-
36	administer such medications in school, at a school sponsored activity or
37	under the supervision of school personnel upon meeting the require-
38	ments of this section.
39	(b) The student shall provide a written statement from the student's
40	health care practitioner containing the following information:
41	(1) The name and purpose of the medication;
42	(2) the prescribed dosage;

43 (3) the time or times the medication is to be regularly administered

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and under what additional special circumstances the medication is to be
 administered; and

(4) the length of time for which the medication is prescribed.

4 (c) The student shall provide a written authorization stating such stu-5 dent has been instructed on self-administration of the medication and is 6 authorized to do so in school. The statements required in subsections (b) 7 and (c) of this section shall be kept on file in the office of the school nurse 8 or school administrator.

9 (d) The school district or governing body of each public and non-10 public school shall inform the parent or guardian of the student that the school and its employees and agents shall incur no liability as a result of 11 any injury sustained by the student from the self-administration of such 12 13 medications. The parent or guardian of the student shall sign a statement 14 acknowledging that the school shall incur no liability and the parent or 15guardian shall indemnify and hold harmless the school, its employees and its agents against any claims relating to the self-administration of such 16 17medications. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to relieve lia-18 bility of the school, its employees or its agents for negligence.

(e) The permission for self-administration of medications shall be effective for the school year in which it is granted and shall be renewed
each following school year upon fulfilling the requirements of subsections
(b), (c) and (d) of this section.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after itspublication in the statute book.

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
