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12AN ACT relating to education; concerning technical colleges; relating 13 to the powers and duties of the governing bodies thereof; concerning 14counties providing certain funds for technical colleges; amend-15ing K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-4470a, 72-4478 and 74-8724 and repealing 16 the existing section sections. 1718Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas: 19 Section 1. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-4470a is hereby amended to read 20as follows: 72-4470a. (a) On or before July 1, 2005, all technical college 21boards shall develop and present to the state board of regents a plan to 22 replace the governing body described in K.S.A. 72-4470, and amend-23 ments thereto, with a new governing board, which shall be separate and 24 independent of any board of education of any school district, to operate, 25control and manage the technical college. The plan shall include, but not 26 be limited to, provisions relating to: 27(1)The composition of the independent governing board; 28the territory of the technical college. If the territory of the tech-(2)29nical college includes more than one county, the plan shall designate a 30 home county; 31 (3)the method of election or appointment and the terms of service 32 of the members of the independent governing board; 33 the date upon which the independent governing board shall as-(4)34 sume management and control of the technical college; 35 the manner, terms upon which and extent to which the facilities, (5)36 will be transferred to the independent governing board and the division 37 of other assets and indebtedness and other liabilities; and 38 the manner and terms upon which faculty, employees and stu-(6)39 dents will be transferred to the independent governing board. Subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-4478, and amendments thereto, 4041such provisions shall specify terms of employment and address other per-42sonnel matters. 43 (b) (1) Upon approval of the plan by the state board of regents and 1 the governing body of the technical college which submitted the plan, 2 and on the date determined in the approved plan, the independent gov-3 erning board established under subsection (a) of this section shall operate 4 subject to the rules, regulations and supervision of the state board of 5 regents in the same manner as other technical colleges, technical schools 6 and area vocational technical schools.

7 (2)After June 30, 2007, if the governing body of the technical college 8 and the state board of regents have not approved a plan submitted pur-9 suant to subsection (a), the state board of regents shall have the power 10 to approve the plan and upon such approval and on the date determined 11 in the approved plan, the independent governing board established pur-12 suant to subsection (a) shall operate subject to the rules, regulations and 13 supervision of the state board of regents in the same manner as other 14technical colleges, technical schools and area vocational technical schools. 15(c) In addition to such other powers expressly granted by law and

16 subject to the provisions of subsection (b), the governing board shall have 17 the power to:

(1) Determine the vocational, technology and general education
courses of instruction that will comprise the associate of applied science
degree programs of the college;

21 (2) establish the requirements for satisfactory completion of the as-22 sociate of applied science degree programs of the college;

(3) confer the associate of applied science degree upon students who
successfully complete an associate of applied science degree program of
the college and to award a certificate or diploma to students who successfully complete a vocational education program of the college; and

(4) appoint teaching staff and to fix and determine teacher qualifications, duties and compensation. No teacher appointed to teach courses
comprising the associate of applied science degree programs of the college shall be required to meet certification requirements greater than
those required in the state educational institutions-;

(5) have custody of, and be responsible for, the property of the college
 and shall be responsible for the operation, management and control of the
 college;

35 (6) select a chairperson and such other officers as it deems desirable,
36 from its membership;

37 (7) sue and be sued;

(8) appoint and fix the compensation and term of office of a president
 or chief administrative officer of the college;

40 (9) fix and determine, within state adopted standards for, employee
41 all other employees' qualifications, duties, compensation, terms of office
42 and all other items and conditions of employment;

43 (10) enter into contracts;

1 (11) accept grants or contributions of money or property which the 2 governing board may use for or in aid of any of its purposes; 3 (12) acquire by gift, purchase, lease-purchase or otherwise, and to own, lease, use and operate property, whether real, personal, or mixed, 4 5necessary or desirable for college purposes; 6 accept any gifts, grants or donations; (11)7 (12)acquire and dispose of real or personal property; 8 (13)enter into lease agreements as lessor of any property, whether 9 *real, personal or mixed, which is owned or controlled by the college.* Any; 10 such agreement may specify the purposes for which the property may be 11 used, require that the property be maintained and operated by the lessee, 12and may contain such restrictions or limitations on the use of the property, 13 be entered into for such period of time and include such other terms and 14conditions which the governing board determines to be necessary and 15proper; 16 (14)determine whether any property owned by the college is no 17longer necessary for college purposes and to dispose of the same in such 18manner and upon such terms and conditions as determined by the gov-19 erning board; 20(15) adopt any rules and regulations, not inconsistent with the pro-21visions of law or with rules and regulations of the state board of regents, 22 that are necessary and proper for the administration and operation of a 23 college and for the conduct of business of the governing board; 24 (16) exercise all powers not inconsistent with the provisions of law or 25with the rules and regulations of the state board of regents which may be 26 necessary or incidental to the establishment, maintenance and operation 27of a college; 28(14) adopt any rules and regulations, not inconsistent with any law or any rules and regulations of the state board of regents, which 2930 are necessary for the administration and operation of the college or 31 for the conduct of business of the governing board; 32 (17) (15) contract with one or more agencies, either public or private, 33 whether located within or outside the territory of the college or whether 34 located within or outside the state of Kansas for the conduct by any such 35 agency of academic or vocational education for students of the college and 36 to provide for the payment to any such agency for the contracted edu-37 cational services from any funds or moneys of the college, including funds 38 or moneys received from student tuition and fees; 39 (18) hold title to property and contract in the name of the governing 40 board of the college; and 41 (19) (16) appoint as its resident agent for the purpose of service of 42process, either the president of the technical college or the chairperson of

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43 the governing board, or both.; and

1 (17) take any other action, not inconsistent with any law or any 2 rules and regulations of the state board of regents, which is neces-3 sary or incidental to the establishment, operation and maintenance 4 of the college;

5 (18) issue bonds for capital improvement projects, enter into 6 bond covenants and take such ancillary action as the governing 7 board approves, relating thereto except that such bonds shall not 8 be secured by a pledge of any property tax revenues of the tech-9 nical college; and

10 (19) enter into agreements with counties relating to funding 11 for capital improvement projects at technical colleges.

New Sec. 2. By approval of a majority vote of the county commissioners of any county, the county may enter into agreements
with a technical college in this state providing funds for capital
improvement projects of such a technical college.

16 Sec. 3. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-4478 is hereby amended to read 17 as follows: 72-4478. (a) Any faculty member or employee of a 18 school district whose employment is transferred to a technical col-19 lege pursuant to K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-4470a, and amendments 20 thereto, shall retain all accrued sick leave, vacation leave and per-21 sonal leave accrued at the time of such transfer.

(b) Any faculty member or employee of a school district whose
employment is transferred to a technical college pursuant to K.S.A.
2003 Supp. 72-4470a, and amendments thereto, shall remain eligible for any early retirement incentive program or benefits as if
no transfer had occurred.

(c) Any faculty member or employee of a school district whose
employment is transferred to a technical college pursuant to K.S.A.
2003 Supp. 72-4470a, and amendments thereto, shall retain salary
as if no transfer had occurred.

31 (**d**) Any faculty member or employee of a school district whose 32 employment is transferred to a technical college pursuant to K.S.A. 33 2003 Supp. 72-4470a, and amendments thereto, shall retain 34 earned due process and collective bargaining protections and rights 35 as if no transfer had occurred. Organizations representing technical 36 college faculty members shall continue to represent such faculty members, 37 subject to K.S.A. 72-5413 et seq., and amendments thereto. Organizations 38 representing technical college employees shall continue to represent such 39 employees unless rescinded pursuant to subsection (c) of K.S.A. 75-4321, 40and amendments thereto, by an elected governing board. 41 New Sec. 4. As used in this act:

42 (a) "Faculty member" means any employee of a technical col-43 lege who, before their employment was transferred from a school

district to the technical college pursuant to K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 72-1 2 4470a, and amendments thereto, was a professional employee of 3 a school district, as that term is defined by subsection (c) of K.S.A. 72-5413, and amendments thereto. 4 (b) "Employee" means any employee of the technical college 56 who is not a faculty member. 7 Sec. 5. K.S.A. 2003 Supp. 74-8724 is hereby amended to read 8 as follows: 74-8724. (a) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the 9 contrary, the Kansas lottery commission shall establish an instant 10 lottery scratch-off game games designated as the veterans benefit 11 game games, which shall be conducted by the Kansas lottery. Tickets 12for the veterans benefit game established by this section shall be offered 13 for sale only between May 1 through November 30, 2003, and May 1 14through November 30, 2004. Four such games shall be offered in the year after May 1, 2004, in a timing sequence specified by the Kansas lottery 1516 commission. 17(b) The Kansas lottery commission shall adopt rules and reg-18ulations governing the establishment of the veterans benefit game 19 pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8710, and amendments thereto, except that 20subsection (b) of K.S.A. 74-8710, and amendments thereto, shall 21not apply to the veterans benefit game games established by this 22 section. 23 (c) Notwithstanding the provisions of K.S.A. 79-4801 et seq., 24 and K.S.A. 74-8711, and amendments thereto, all net profits, re-25ceived from the sale of veterans benefit game games lottery tickets, 26 materials and games, as prescribed by rules and regulations 27adopted pursuant to subsection (b) of this section, shall be depos-28ited in the state treasury and credited, as follows: (1) An amount 29equal to 50% of such net profits to the national guard assistance 30 account of the state general fund of the state board of regents to 31 be used for Kansas national guard educational assistance act schol-32 arships pursuant to K.S.A. 74-32,145 et seq., and amendments 33 thereto, and (2) an amount equal to 50% of such net profits to the soldiers' home fee fund and the veterans' home fee fund in an 34 35 amount or amounts determined by the executive director of the 36 Kansas commission on veterans affairs to be used for operating 37 expenditures and capital improvements for the Kansas veterans' 38 home, the Kansas soldiers' home and the state veterans cemetery system. 39 The Kansas lottery commission shall change the design or 40(**d**)

41theme of the veterans benefit game games regularly so that the

42game remains competitive with the other instant lottery scratch-43

off games offered by such commission. The tickets for the instant

lottery game authorized by this section shall clearly state that the 1

2 profits derived from the game shall be used to benefit veterans 3 and veterans issues in this state.

6 cial aid. Such study shall be submitted to the governor and legis-7 lature on or before January 10, 2005.
