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8 AN ACT enacting a long-term care bill of rights; concerning older Kan-9 10sans; relating to appropriate long-term care for the elderly and disabled in Kansas; prescribing long-term care principles for future policy 11 12development. 13 14WHEREAS, The demand for long-term care services and home and 15community-based services in Kansas will continue to grow greatly in com-16 ing years; and 17WHEREAS, People of all ages with disabilities and older persons in 18 Kansas need access to a comprehensive array of long-term care services 19that includes institutional and home and community-based services; and 20 WHEREAS, The cost of providing long-term care in Kansas is increas-21ing rapidly, with a disproportionate share of state funds allocated to pro-22 viding institutional care; and 23WHEREAS, Waiting lists to access needed home and community-24 based services, where Kansans of all ages want to receive services, con-25tinue to grow; and 26 WHEREAS, The vast majority of disabled persons of all ages and sen-27 iors want to live their lives with dignity, freedom and independence and 28want to be able to choose appropriate levels and kinds of care, when 29 needed: Now, therefore, Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of 30 Kansas: 31 Section 1. (a) The state of Kansas finds and declares that, in keeping 32 with the traditional concept of the inherent dignity of the individual in 33 our democratic society, the older and disabled individuals are entitled to 34 enjoy their later years in health, honor and dignity; that funding for long-35 term care and home and community-based services is a priority; and that 36 future state policy development shall be guided by the following 37 principles: 38 (1) The state of Kansas shall strive to provide a comprehensive, in-39 tegrated long-term care system that is responsive to the varied long-term 40 care needs of Kansans of any age or economic status; 41 public policy related to long-term care should stress the individ-(2)ual's choice, autonomy, self-determination and privacy; 42 43 (3)the elderly and disabled Kansans shall receive the necessary care

1 and services at the least cost and in the least confining setting;

2 (4) public funding for long-term care shall afford Kansans throughout 3 the state the choice of a broad array of home and community-based 4

services;

5public funding shall improve access to and stress institutional op-(5)6 tions other than nursing homes, as well as care in the home and 7 community;

8 (6) long-term care system eligibility requirements and reimburse-9 ments shall create incentives to serve people in the most appropriate care 10 setting of their choice;

(7) home and community-based care services shall be expanded and 11 12improved to support and complement the services provided by informal 13 caregivers;

14(8) consumers should have meaningful information about their care 15options, as well as the quality of care provided by providers of all kinds, 16 for their decision making; and

17(9) the system should have a strong advocacy and oversight system to 18 help those in need.

19 (b) In carrying out the principles stated in subsection (a), the state of 20Kansas shall:

21(1) Coordinate the effective and efficient provision of long-term care 22 and home and community-based services to older and disabled Kansans 23to ensure that long-term care and home and community-based services 24are readily available to the greatest number over the widest geographic 25area; and

26(2) create a cost-effective and efficient long-term care system for the 27future that assures:

28 (\mathbf{A}) Continued reduction of the state's reliance on nursing homes; and

29(B) balanced use of financial resources to insure access to quality care 30 in the home and the community, as well as in institutions.

31 (c) This section shall be known and may be cited as the Kansas long-32 term care bill of rights.

33 Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 34 publication in the statute book.

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
