## HOUSE BILL No. 2779

9 AN ACT relating to education; concerning a bill of religious rights for 10 students and others. 11 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas: 12Section 1. (a) The state board of education shall establish on or be-13 14fore September 1, 2008, a written religious bill of rights for public school 15students and their parents or guardians that outline existing and inalien-16 able individual religious rights. The religious bill of rights for public school 17students and their parents or guardians shall include, but need not be 18limited to, a declaration that a public school student has an inalienable 19right to: 20(1)Express such person's religious beliefs on a public school campus 21and at a school-sponsored event to the same extent as such person may 22 express personal secular viewpoints; 23 participate in a private religious ceremony held on a public school (2)24 campus outside of instructional time; 25exchange an item with a religious theme when greeting cards or (3)26other items are exchanged at a public school; 27 (4)sing religious songs along with secular songs as part of a school-28sponsored or curriculum-related program; 29 (5)use a religious greeting; 30 wear religious garb on a public school campus, including but not (6)31limited to, clothing with a religious message; 32 express such person's religious beliefs in responding to a school (7)33 assignment if the response fairly meets the educational purpose of the 34 assignment; 35 select religious material for a school assignment if the material (8)36 fairly meets the educational purpose of the assignment; and 37 (9)recite religious material when an oral recitation is assigned if the 38 religious material fairly meets the educational purpose of the assignment. 39 No later than September 1, 2008, the state board shall establish (b) 40 a written religious bill of rights for teachers and employees of public 41schools that outlines existing and inalienable individual religious rights. 42The religious bill of rights for teachers and employees of public schools 43 shall include, but need not be limited to, a declaration that a teacher or

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1 an employee of a public school has an inalienable right to:

2 (1) Teach a religious topic in public school for historical or literary 3 purposes;

(2) teach the religious origin of a holiday;

(3) display religious materials and items that relate to a topic being
discussed in the classroom, including, but not limited to, a creche during
Christmas or a menorah during Hanukkah;

8 (4) allow students to exchange items with religious themes when 9 greeting cards or other items are normally exchanged;

(5) participate in a non-school-sponsored activity that is considered
religious, including, but not limited to, bible clubs and prayer meetings;
(6) answer a student's question on a religious topic;

13 (7) not be required to teach a topic that violates the teacher's religious14 beliefs and not be disciplined for refusing to teach the topic;

15 (8) wear religious jewelry; and

(9) use a religious greeting as a recognition of a religious holiday.

(c) On or before July 1, 2009, and on or before July 1 each year
thereafter, the state board shall prepare updated guidelines to the religious bills of rights and distribute them to the local boards of education.

20 (d) On or before August 1, 2008, the state board shall post the relig-21 ious bills of rights on its official website.

Sec. 2. (a) In addition to any other duty required to be performed by law, each local board of education no later than December 1, 2008, shall adopt written policies and procedures to implement the religious bills of rights as established by the state board of education under provisions of section 1, and amendments thereto, including, but not limited to, ways to:

(1) Inform annually each public high school student in writing at the
beginning of each school year or, in the case of a new or transfer student,
at the time of enrollment of the religious bill of rights. Each public high
school shall keep on file a copy of the student's acknowledgment of receipt of the religious bill of rights.

(2) Inform annually each parent or guardian of a newly registered or continuing public high school, middle school, junior high school and elementary school student in writing at the beginning of each school year of the religious bill of rights. Each middle school, junior high school or elementary school shall keep on file a signed document from the parent or guardian that states the parent or guardian is aware of the religious bill of rights.

(3) Provide a written copy of the religious bill of rights to each new
public school employee at the new employee's orientation and to each
existing employee by December 1, 2008, and by August 1 each year
thereafter.

(4) Provide annually each public school employee, including teachers
 and administrators, with updated guidelines concerning the goal and use
 of the religious bill of rights, as defined by the state board of education.
 Each public school employee shall sign a form confirming receipt of this
 information. The employee shall receive a copy of the signed form and a
 copy shall be kept in the employee's personnel file.

7 (5) Provide information to each public school teacher concerning the
8 religious bill of rights through written materials and discussions at annual
9 teacher in-service meetings and through annual written communication
10 to teachers within one month prior to the start of each school year.

(b) In addition to the duties set forth in subsection (1) of this section,
each local board of education shall adopt policies and procedures
allowing:

14 (1) A high school student to opt out of any class or the use of specific 15 course material that is inconsistent with the student's religious beliefs; or

(2) a parent or guardian of an elementary school, middle school or
junior high school student to excuse the student from any class or the use
of specific course material that is inconsistent with the parent's religious
beliefs.

20 Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its 21 publication in the statute book.
